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Executive Summary

Federal transportation program reauthorizations SAFTEA-LU (Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act), MAP-21 (Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act), FAST Act (Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act) and the BIL (Bipartisan Infrastructure Law) require that federally funded mobility projects be included in a locally developed, Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Coordination Plan. The plan must be developed and approved through a process that includes seniors, individuals with disabilities, and people with low incomes and is coordinated to the maximum extent possible with transportation services assisted by other federal departments and agencies.

A Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Coordination Plan identifies the transportation needs of seniors, individuals with disabilities, and people with low incomes, provides strategies for meeting those local needs and prioritizes transportation services for funding and implementation. Local plans may be developed on a local, regional, or statewide level. The decision as to the boundaries of the local planning areas should be made in consultation with the state, designated recipient of FTA programs, and the Metropolitan Planning Organization, where applicable.

Federal Transit Administration requires that projects selected for funding under the Enhanced Mobility for Individuals and Individuals with Disabilities (Section 5310) Program be "included in a locally developed, coordinated public transit-human services transportation plan," and that the plan be "developed and approved through a process that included participation by seniors, individuals with disabilities, representatives of public, private and nonprofit transportation and human services providers and other members of the public" utilizing transportation services.

The Southwest Missouri Council of Governments (SMCOG) has developed a comprehensive transit plan aimed at improving transportation coordination and cooperation in the region. This plan covers Barry, Christian, Dade, Dallas, Greene, Lawrence, Polk, Stone, Taney, and Webster counties, with the primary goal of addressing service gaps and preparing for future transportation needs.

The development of this plan involved engaging representatives from local government, transportation and human service providers, public, private, and non-profit sectors, seniors, individuals with disabilities, and people with low incomes, ensuring a comprehensive and inclusive approach. To address transportation needs effectively in the SMCOG region, the plan focused on the following key elements recommended by the Federal Transit Administration:

Identifying Existing Transportation Providers: The plan conducted a thorough inventory of available transit services in the region, involving 26 human service agencies, 4 transportation providers, and over 50 users. This assessment served as a foundation for understanding the current transit landscape and identifying potential areas for improvement.

Addressing the Needs of Vulnerable Populations: Special attention was given to the transportation needs of older adults, individuals with low income, and people with disabilities. The plan aims to create targeted strategies that ensure equitable access to transportation services.

Strategies to Bridge Service Gaps: The plan identifies and addresses existing gaps in transit services within the region. By recognizing where services may be lacking, the transit plan provides strategies to enhance connectivity and accessibility for all residents, even in rural and underserved areas.

Prioritization and Feasibility: Recognizing the constraints of available resources and time, the plan prioritizes the implementation of strategies. By focusing on feasibility and maximizing efficiency, the transit plan ensures the most impactful and sustainable improvements to the region's transportation infrastructure.

Public transit is a lifeline for numerous communities in the area, particularly for individuals with limited access to personal vehicles due to age, disability, or low income. However, providing cost-effective transit options can be challenging for smaller communities. This plan highlights the potential of regional cooperation in mitigating such issues. By reducing one-way trips, consolidating passenger destinations, and sharing resources, communities can optimize their transit systems, making them more financially viable and sustainable.

By addressing service gaps and prioritizing strategies that cater for the needs of vulnerable populations, this transit plan not only complies with federal requirements but also creates a resilient and inclusive transportation network that fosters regional growth and prosperity. Introduction

Throughout the Ozarks, public transit is a vital necessity for many communities. Individuals with limited access to personal vehicles - which could come as a result of complications arising from age, disability, or low income - are especially dependent on this resource. If public transportation options are not available, many residents may find themselves unable to fulfill basic needs, such as going to the grocery store, a doctor's appointment, or work.

Public transit can be an expensive utility to provide, especially for smaller communities that struggle to maintain the density of ridership needed to sustain routes. Regional cooperation can help mitigate these issues by reducing the number of one-way trips, clustering passengers into fewer destinations, and sharing the use of transportation personnel, equipment, and facilities.

As part of this planning process, a survey was sent to a variety of transit providers in the SMCOG region. The survey was used to conduct an inventory of available transit services in the region, as well as identify where gaps and duplication of service may exist. Survey respondents included 26 human service agencies, 4 transportation providers, and 50+ users.

Service Area

In 2022, the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission contracted with the Southwest Missouri Council of Governments (SMCOG) to update the Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Coordination Plan (PTHSTCP) for the 10 counties comprising the SMCOG transportation planning area. Those include Barry, Greene, Christian, Dade, Dallas, Lawrence, Polk, Stone, Taney, and Webster Counties. SMCOG is one of 19 Regional Planning Commissions (RPCs) in Missouri responsible for rural transportation planning in the state. Figure 1 shows the location of SMCOG's 10-county region in relation to the overall State of Missouri.

The Ozarks Transportation Organization (OTO) serves as the appointed Metropolitan Planning Organization responsible for the Springfield region, encompassing parts of Greene and Christian counties. Moreover, the federal government designates OTO as one of the three Transportation Management Areas (TMA) in Missouri. OTO's service area is also shown in Figure 1.

Current Services

The SMCOG planning area has a variety of transportation services, catering for the diverse needs of its residents. These services play a crucial role in ensuring efficient and accessible mobility for all. Currently, the following services are available to facilitate seamless transportation within the region:

OATS

OATS serves as the primary transit provider for a significant portion of rural Missouri, covering all ten counties within SMCOG. Operating as a not-for-profit 501(c)3 corporation, OATS offers transportation services across 87 counties in Missouri, catering to the needs of the rural public, senior citizens, and

individuals with disabilities.

Throughout most of the region, particularly in rural areas, OATS services are open to the public and routes are posted on the OATS website. Trips within the city limits of Springfield, however, are senior exclusive. Sheltered workshop routes operate in a similar manner, not advertised and limited to the designated group.

OATS offers a diverse range of trips, connecting rural areas within SMCOG's ten counties to major cities like Springfield. Most of these trips to Springfield occur monthly, while express trips from Barry, Stone, and Taney County are available twice a month.

OATS plays a crucial role in providing transportation services across these counties, facilitating travel for various purposes such as shopping, visits to senior centers, and doctor appointments, ensuring accessibility and mobility for the communities they serve.

Local Community Transportation Services

In some areas, community or city-based transportation options are available. For instance, in the City of Mt. Vernon, there is a taxi service operated by the Mt. Vernon Transportation Department, catering primarily to seniors and disabled citizens. The fare for this service is \$1.00 per ride each way, with a reduced rate of \$0.50 per ride each way for senior and disabled passengers.

Similarly, the City of Branson offers the Branson trolley, which allows riders to conveniently board or alight at any of its thirteen downtown stops. This service is provided free of charge to both residents and visitors and was made possible through funding from a Community Improvement District (CID).

Private Companies

In the SMCOG region, there are several private transportation options available. These services cater for both larger and smaller communities and are delivered by various providers. The City

of Branson offers taxi services, as well as shuttle options like the Branson Loop and the popular ride-sharing services, Uber and Lyft.

Furthermore, Greenfield nursing home facilitates transportation for certain residents by providing a van to assist them in reaching medical appointments. In other communities such as Bolivar and Cassville, private taxi services are available. Additionally, Uber and Lyft have extended their services to some of the smaller communities, including Miller.

Senior Centers

Certain senior centers in the area provide transportation services for medical appointments and offer home-delivered meals. For instance, the Marshfield Senior Center offers transportation for medical appointments when other options are not accessible. Additionally, numerous senior centers in the region provide home-delivered meals through Senior Age for adults who are unable to leave their homes.

Sheltered Workshops

Sheltered workshops offer employment opportunities tailored to support individuals with disabilities. Burrell Working Solutions, located in Bolivar, MO, facilitates transportation services for individuals with disabilities to commute to and from work. Numerous other sheltered workshops collaborate with OATS to arrange transportation for their employees.

Funding Overview

Securing robust and sustainable funding is the cornerstone of any successful transportation plan. In this section, a comprehensive overview of the financial framework that underpins the implementation of the plan is presented. As this plan seeks to address the pressing challenges and opportunities facing our region's transportation infrastructure – aiming to create a seamless, efficient, and environmentally responsible network for the benefit of our region – it is essential to recognize that adequate funding not only fuels the execution of our ambitious projects, but also ensures their long-term viability and sustainability. In this section, we delve into the various funding sources that will support the realization of our vision, fostering economic growth, reducing congestion, and enhancing the overall quality of life in our region. Generally, the potential funding sources for this plan can be distilled into six broad spheres, which are as follows: Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities (Section 5310); Formula Grants for Rural Areas (Section 5311); Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA); Areas of Persistent Poverty Program; Bus and Bus Facilities Program; and Innovation Coordinated Access and Mobility Grants. These are further explained in subsequent sections.

Enhanced Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities (Section 5310)

This program provides funding through a formula program that aids in supporting the needs of older adults and people with disabilities. Funds are apportioned to direct recipients for rural and small urban areas by MoDOT. Traditional Section 5310 projects include buses and vans, wheelchair lifts/ramps, transit-related information technology systems, and acquisition of transportation services. Non-traditional programs include travel training, volunteer driver programs, purchasing vehicles to support accessible taxi services, and more. The federal share of capital costs cannot exceed 80% of total project cost and 50% of operating assistance. The 10% that is eligible to fund program administrative costs may be funded at 100% federal

share. Funds are apportioned among states by a formula based on the number of seniors and people with disabilities in each state.

Formula Grants for Rural Areas (Section 5311)

This program provides capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with a population of under 50,000, where many residents rely on public transit to reach their destinations. The program also provides funding for state and national training and technical assistance through the Rural Transportation Assistance Program. Eligible activities include planning, capital, operating, job access and reverse commute projects, and acquisition of public transportation services. The federal funding share is 80% for capital projects and 50% for operating assistance. They will also fund 80% for Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) non-fixed route paratransit services. Funds are apportioned to states based on a formula that considers land area, population, revenue vehicle miles, and low-income individuals in rural areas.

Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA)

This program provides credit assistance for qualified projects of regional or national significance. Eligible applicants include state and local governments, transit agencies, railroad companies, special authorities, special districts, and private entities. These loans have up to 35-year repayment periods, with the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) allowing up to 75 years for some projects, with repayment being deferrable for five years after substantial project completion. There is no penalty for pre-payment. Through the BIL, transit and transit-oriented development projects can borrow up to 49% of project costs with low interest rates that do not accrue until proceeds are drawn.

Areas of Persistent Poverty Program

This program awards grants to eligible applicants for planning, engineering, or development of technical or financing plans for projects eligible under Chapter 53 of title 49, United States Code, to assist Areas of Persistent Poverty and Historically Disadvantaged Communities. These projects include transit system improvement, new transit routes, engineering for transit facilities and improvement to existing facilities, planning for a new bus facility or intermodal center that supports transit services, and more. Information on areas designated as Areas of Persistent Poverty and Historically Disadvantaged Communities can be found on the Federal Transit Administration's website, where they provided a mapping tool that allows applicants to determine project eligibility. The minimum federal share for this program is not less than 90%.

Bus and Bus Facilities Program

This program makes federal resources available to states and direct recipients to replace, rehabilitate, and purchase buses and related equipment and to construct bus-related facilities. Funding is provided through formula allocations and competitive grants. Capital projects that replace, rehabilitate, and purchase vans, buses, and related facilities, as well as construct bus related facilities, are eligible for federal funds. States, local governmental entities, and private nonprofit organizations that operate fixed route bus services or provide public transportation are also eligible for funds. The federal share for eligible capital costs is 80% of the project cost but can exceed 80% for certain projects related to the ADA and Clean Air Act.

Innovative Coordinated Access and Mobility Grants

This program provides funds for innovative capital projects for the transportation-disadvantaged that improve the coordination of non-emergency medical transportation services. There is no minimum or

maximum grant award amount, with FTA funding as many meritorious projects as possible. Projects that are selected may not receive the full requested amount. Eligible applicants include state and local governmental authorities, private nonprofit organizations, and operators of public transportation. The minimum federal share of project costs is 80%, with the local share being at least 20% of the net project cost.

Volkswagen Diesel Emissions Environmental Mitigation Trust

This program provides funding to individuals, companies, governments, and other entities to fulfill projects aimed at reducing air pollution from vehicles and other mobile sources. Administered and allocated by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources, this funding can be directed towards the replacement of existing diesel vehicles with newer, more energy efficient and environmentally friendly alternatives. Such vehicles include school buses, private and publicly owned trucks and emergency vehicles, transit and shuttle buses, as well as locomotives, marine vehicles, and airport and cargo equipment. The program also provides funding for the development and improvement of electric vehicle charging stations. There is no minimum or maximum award amount, but the state is incentivized to utilize the full amount of its allocations, which amounts to over \$41 million between 2017 and 2027.

Planning Process

To update the PTHSTCP, the initial phase involved creating a revised roster of transit and human service providers serving the counties within the SMCOG planning area. To accomplish this, SMCOG staff employed a combination of resources, including a list from past plans and online searches to identify new additions. All relevant agencies were reached through public meeting notifications and surveys. Moreover, email lists were cross-checked and refreshed whenever possible. A full list is available in Appendix F.



In February 2023, a survey was developed to gather information for transportation coordination in the SMCOG region. The survey was made available on the SMCOG website, and paper copies were mailed to all relevant organizations. Additionally, the survey was distributed at community meetings held in February and March.



Throughout the SMCOG region, 10 community meetings were conducted to encourage participation from transit and human service providers, senior citizens, individuals with disabilities, and individuals with low-income.



Both the survey responses and inputs from community meeting attendees directly contributed to identifying the transportation needs of seniors, people with low-income, and individuals with disabilities.



The needs identified during the survey and the first round of meetings were synthesized into strategies and prioritized during the second rounc of public input meetings.



This plan serves as a roadmap to enhance transportation coordination in Southwest Missouri. The strategies outlined in the plan will guide future projects aimed at optimizing the use of federal grants. The plan was approved by the SMCOG board on **December 6, 2023.**

Regional Demographics

The Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Coordination Plan (PTHSTCP) aims to designate funding to transportation projects that benefit the elderly, disabled, and low-income individuals. The focus groups provide an understanding of the targets for demographic research.

Elderly Persons

In 2021, the ten-county region was home to 115,058 elderly persons, which is a 25% increase from the amount in 2010 (91,895). Stone County (30.7%), Dade County (23.8%), and Taney County (22.0%) have the highest percentage of elderly persons above 65. Additionally, there was a 37.28% increase in the elderly population between the ages of 70 to 74 from 2010 to 2021 across the entire region.




Figure 5 Source: US Census-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates




Figure 6 Source: US Census-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates

Persons with Disabilities

According to 2021 ACS 5-year data, 37.37% of residents 65 and over have disabilities or 95,985 residents in the ten-county region. Christian, Greene, Polk, and Webster counties each have total disability compositions near 14% (entire population), which is comparable to the state average of 14.40%. Barry, Dade, and Taney counties have a slightly higher average proportion of total individuals with disabilities, at 15.90%, 16.20%, and 15.80%, respectively. Dallas, Lawrence, and Stone counties have the highest proportion of persons with disabilities, at close to 20%. Ambulatory difficulty was the most common disability with a regional average percentage of 8.80%. The other highly ranking disabilities were independent living difficulty at 6.88%, cognitive difficulty at 6.52%, and hearing difficulty at 5.10%.




Figure 7 Source: US Census-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates

Low to Moderate Income Persons

Based on 2021 ACS 5-year Estimates, Dallas County had the highest percentage of residents below the 150% poverty line at 21.1%. Eight of the ten SMCOG counties have 9% or more of their population that are both over the age of 65 and below the 150% poverty line. Webster and Lawrence counties had the highest instances of poverty among the elderly population at 10.60% and 10%, respectively. The average median household income in the ten-county region is \$52,056.60, which is 14.7% lower than the state's median household income of \$61,043.00. In the ten-county region, Christian County has the highest median household income of \$69,212, while Dade County has the lowest at \$43,661.




Figure 8 Source: US Census-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates

Regional Transportation Trends

According to the ACS 2021 5-year estimates Christian, Dallas, Stone, and Webster Counties have the highest percentage of residents who worked outside of their county of residence. This increases their reliance on different modes of transportation to get to work and home.




Figure 9 Source: US Census-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates




Figure 10 Source: US Census-2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates

The main mode of transportation in the region is a car, truck, or van. This may include people who depend on other's personal vehicle to commute. However, a public transit option may be desired. Therefore, having alternative means of transportation is important to improve access to various areas in the region.

Public Involvement

Public involvement in the planning process is necessary for the successful implementation of the plan. To engage the public in the planning process, SMCOG held community meetings throughout the region and invited human service agencies, transportation providers, and transportation users.

Kickoff Meetings

Community meetings were held in all ten counties of the SMCOG region. The table to the left shows the meeting dates and locations for each county's meetings.

The purpose of these meetings was to speak with individuals and organizations

involved in the provision or usage of public transportation. Attendees were introduced to the SMCOG staff and informed of the need for an updated plan. The importance of public involvement and the role of SMCOG were also discussed. The main task of the meetings was to gather information about issues and needs in the community regarding public transportation, with specific emphasis on seniors and individuals with disabilities and low-income.

Information gathered from the first round of public meetings is summarized below. It should be noted that some public meetings did not have attendees and are therefore not listed below.

Barry County

- The main barriers to public transit are geography, distance, and weather, which limits how effectively OATS is able to reach residents.
- Road and infrastructure conditions are also quite poor and make accessibility difficult for both public transit services and residents.
- OATS lacks the funding to run every day, and is limited to only 4 days a week, during which they
 travel to different cities in the county.
 - OATS hours often don't align with those needed for medical appointments.
- Main destinations include local family life centers, clinics, dentists, and other medical facilities, as well as the YMCA for social events, and the Roaring River State Park for work.

Dade County

- Many residents lack personal vehicles and are reliant on either public transit options, family, or volunteers.
- OATS has had trouble getting ridership and has had miscommunications with residents.
 - o Some residents reported calling OATS and then never being picked up.
 - OATS services the county only one day per week.
- OATS needs to work with the senior centers in the area to arrange routes between them and other needed destinations, such as to medical appointments in Springfield and Bolivar.
 - o There is currently no OATS route to Springfield from Dade County.
 - o In the past, OATS struggled to acquire ridership needed to maintain such routes.

Dallas County

- OATS covers the entire county, and runs routes 5 days per week, 8 hours per day.
 - Are available for appointment pickups if requested 30 days in advance.
- There is a high poverty rate in the county.
 - Estimated that 400-600 families don't have personal vehicles.
- There is a stigma against using public transit, rather than driving themselves, and rumors have spread that hurt OATS' reputation.
 - There is a potential need for a marketing and advertising campaign for OATS.
- Need to focus on underserved populations who live outside of the main cities.
 - o These include the county's Mennonite and Amish population.
 - The latter will not use OATS and will only use locally funded public transit.

Greene County

- OATS is the primary public transit service provider outside of Springfield.
- Many seniors are anxious to go to Springfield due to its intimidating traffic, and would rather go to Marshfield, Buffalo, or Bolivar.
- OATS within the county is funded by the Greene County Senior Service Fund, but that funding only applies to Greene County residents.
 - There is a need for funding to serve residents from other counties.
- Within Springfield, only seniors can ride the OATS bus, and all residents younger than 60 are served by buses run by City Utilities.
- OATS is established in Fair Grove, and runs 5 days per week, but most trips are limited to senior centers.
 - OATS would like to change this and should advertise the other destinations they can take riders to, such as to the grocery store and other shops.
- Many seniors are interested in using OATS to reach the grocery stores, but their scheduling doesn't line up with OATS route schedules.

Lawrence County

- Mt. Vernon has an affordable taxi service (both cars and larger vans; all are accessible) which serves those within city limits.
 - o \$1 per ride, or \$0.50 for seniors.
 - Subsidized by federal funding.
 - Despite this, funding for operational costs is still limited.

- Offers rides Tuesday-Thursday.
 - Lacks drivers so they can't offer 5-day service.
- Funding and staffing are big issues for both OATS and other public transit providers.
- Difficulty in scheduling routes to accommodate all work schedules.
 - o Many residents take buses to work, and then are forced to walk home.
- Many residents also use transportation provided by Medicaid, as it is free for those users.
- There is a need for more transportation options in North Lawrence County, as most are focused on the south.
 - This is especially true for residents with developmental disabilities.

Polk County

- There are existing taxi services in many towns and cities.
- Uber and Lyft are options many would be interested in.
 - o Potential problems include cost, and technology barrier for seniors.
 - Could be contracted or subsidized.
- There is a desire for OATS to be more accessible and have a more flexible and regular schedule.
- Some cities used to have subsidized bus services, but they were shut down due to lack of ridership.
 - Maybe different now, as there appears to be more demand.
 - o Many churches have bus services as well.
- Most demand is directed towards trips to Springfield, with Kansas City and St. Louis being secondary priorities.

Stone County

- Geography is the largest barrier to public transit in the county, as the distance between towns is large and the terrain is hard to navigate.
 - As such, OATS treats the Northern and Southern halves of the county as separate, with their own days for routes.
- It is difficult to find funding for the operational costs (wages, fuel, etc.) associated with public transit in the area.
 - o Grant funding would be very helpful here.
- Residents are finding it difficult or impossible to get to medical appointments, food pantries, or public facilities such as senior centers.
- Primary destinations include Springfield, Branson, and Harrison (AR) for appointments, as well as Silver Dollar City and Indian Point for employment.
- There is very little coordination between transportation services.
 - Residents are interested in the potential for a coordinated hub-and-spoke transit system, where local organizations and providers, such as senior and medical centers, as well potentially Uber/Lyft, take riders to a central location where OATS could then take them to long-distance destinations.

Taney County

- There is a need for 5310 funding application preparation guidance.
- As a rural county, a traditional bus system will not be effective.
- OATS is the primary rural transportation provider in the area.

- There is a need for a feeder route from different parts of the county to more concentrated
 OATS pickup locations.
- Many people have issues maintaining their personal vehicles.
 - Perhaps an organization could be formed to help subsidize mechanical costs.
- There are many J-1 students (estimated to be about 1,000 in 2023) who have no means of transportation other than public transit, carpooling, or walking.

Webster County

- There are some notable issues with the OATS service in the county.
 - Limited hours, especially for workers.
 - No weekends availability
 - Buses are full every day.
 - There is a lack of drivers, as there is only demand during the mornings and afternoons, leaving them unable to work during the middle of the day.
 - Many routes have only a limited reach outside of cities or around senior centers.
 - Pickups for appointments require notice up to a month in advance, which can make taking care of immediate issues difficult.
- There is a need for alternate methods of movement aside from OATS, as people need to reach specific locations on days OATS may not be available.
 - o Medicare/Medicaid allows people to use Uber/Lyft and other ride-share services.
 - There are many volunteers from senior centers who drive people to appointments but are only paid for gas.

Follow-up Meetings

A series of follow-up meetings were held in each of the ten counties. The table to the right shows the meeting dates and locations for each county.

The purpose of these meeting was to collect public input regarding identified transportation needs and

strategies for senior citizens, persons with disabilities, and those with low incomes. Following the initial kickoff meetings, each county's input was compiled to develop strategies to address those needs. These needs and strategies were then shown to the public in the follow-up

This information will follow in the public prioritization section. Attendees were also asked to provide feedback on any information regarding transportation services. The information gathered is listed below.

Barry County

Need transportation to Rogers, Arkansas and/or Springfield for medical appointments

Christian County

- Not able to pick up residents if the road conditions are very bad
 - If it is unsafe
 - If it damages vehicles
 - Liability issues
- Need central authority over all organizations if you want to span collaboration. Transit routes are bound by county borders and have difficulty traveling between. Organizations that don't get federal funding are severely limited by this

Dade County

- Older adults that need transportation need reliable and consistent scheduling
- It should be free for those over 65 years
- Funding opportunities for individuals (local drivers) using personal vehicle to take people to their destinations e.g. gas money
- Advocate for additional funding to support local drivers
- Funding for Springfield and Bolivar routes

Dallas County

- Current Medicaid transportation is not reliable. It is not able to fund drivers
- Coordinating with the VA, a need for cross-agency collaboration
- Need for local, regional grant workshop (especially public transportation)

Greene County

- Bring back donation system
- Email newsletter for transit
- Send information in more accessible formats
- More routes for better timing

Lawrence County

• Need passenger rail in SW Missouri

Taney County

- More opportunities for low-income individuals (free fare)
- Main concern is taking seniors to medical appointments in Springfield
- Coordinate with local organizations to set up routes. No need for multiple buses for people living only a mile apart. Create a route that accommodates all

Survey Results

The survey was collected from seniors, individuals with disabilities, residents living below the poverty line, transportation providers, and human service agencies for this plan. The transportation providers and human service agencies were identified and contacted by mail and email for additional information if

available. Additionally, participants were asked to share any other information with the service providers that might have been overlooked in the survey process.

Survey

A single survey was created to address each of the target areas: seniors, individuals with disabilities, and individuals with low-income, human service providers, and transportation providers. These surveys were distributed in several ways; paper copies of the survey were available at all ten community meetings, paper copies were distributed to senior centers and food pantries in the region, and available online from February 14, 2023 to March 31, 2023 at www.smcog.org. 115 letters were sent to human service agencies and transportation service providers. A copy of the survey can be found in Appendix A.

Completed Survey Responses

- 26 Human Service Provider Surveys
- 4 Transportation Provider Surveys
- 52 User Surveys

Results

A total of eighty-one surveys were completed. The results of the survey will follow in the next sections and raw totals can be found in Appendix B.

Human Service Agencies




Figure 11 Source: 2023 Public Transit-Human Services Coordination Plan Survey

A variety of human service agencies provided input for this plan as listed in Table 6. Of the 26 human service agencies that completed the survey, eleven were government human service agencies, eleven were private non-profit agencies, and four identified as others. Figure 11 displays what type of clientele the agencies serve.

When asked what type of transportation services the clients from the agencies utilized, twelve responded with demand response/on-demand services, eleven responded with fixed route with fixed schedule, six responded with door-to-door services, six responded with same-day services, and two answered with thru-the-door services.

The majority of the human service agencies help their clients obtain transportation by referring them to transportation providers, covering part of the cost for transportation, and coordinating with other agencies to schedule transportation. Destinations requested/needed by the clients included those to medical facilities, shopping centers, senior centers, financial institutions, and others.

Transportation Providers

The transportation providers allow for medical, recreation, and education trips; some are limited to the City of Springfield, while some providers travel to rural areas such as Sparta, Nixa, Branson, and Bolivar. Table 7 lists the transportation providers that responded to the survey. Service types included in the survey are door-to-door and demand response/on-demand.

- Door-to-door services allow users to be picked up and dropped off directly from their location of choice. Door-to-door usually includes assistance from the transportation provider.
- Demand response/on-demand services provide transportation based on passengers needs and requests. This service does not usually operate on a fixed route or timetabled schedule, therefore providing flexibility for the users.

Of the transportation service providers that responded to the survey, four provided demand response/on-demand services and three provided door-to-door services.

The types of clients served by the transportation provider respondents were individuals who have a disability, those over the age of 60, and living below the poverty level. These transportation services are not specifically targeted towards the groups mentioned as other individuals can use them. Most transportation providers have eligibility requirements for persons wanting to use their services; most require a person to be a resident of community or a client of their program. According to the survey, the transportation providers responded that their services were restricted in some way such as medical visits only, geographic restrictions, and others.

The transportation providers' primary days of operation are mostly during the weekdays, with a few open on the weekends and in the evenings. This reflects an increase in user demand for more weekend and evening trips to various destinations.

Users

Outreach for transportation users was focused on seniors, individuals with disabilities, and residents living below the poverty line. The survey was distributed online as well as paper copies at public meetings and senior centers. Paper copies were dropped off at senior centers, food pantries, OACAC, and OATS buses throughout the region.




Figure 12 Source: 2023 Public Transit-Human Services Coordination Plan Survey

Figure 11 summarizes the participants that completed the user survey. The largest survey group is participants who identified as over 65, which was about 53% of the total users. It should also be noted that individuals in this group might identify as a person who belongs in multiple categories. For those that completed the survey and have a disability, 46% have a physical disability, 9% have a visual disability, and 3% have a cognitive disability. When asked the open-ended questions regarding what destinations users would like to see improved access to, respondents stated these following destinations as the highest need:

- Medical facilities 37
- Bank or other local businesses 32
- Restaurants 26
- Senior Center 25




Figure 13 Source: 2023 Public Transit-Human Services Coordination Plan Survey

Figure 13 displays information on what can be changed to better meet the user's transportation needs. The top selected answers were:

- Evening Service 12
- Weekend Service 12
- Affordability 11
- Door to Door Service 9

This shows a desire for evening and weekend service to the highest need destinations such as medical facilities, events, and shopping centers. On the open-ended questions of the survey on comments regarding transportation, most respondents mentioned accessibility, affordability, and more transportation options with more services. Affordability for transportation services was highly requested by the survey respondents to get access to various locations. This is because about 14% of respondents rely on government assistance and 20% get help from family or friends to pay for transportation.

Needs Assessment

The survey of human service agencies, transportation providers, and users identified several key needs for the regional transit system. These needs are summarized in the section below.

Human Service / Transportation Provider Needs

- Additional monetary support for the purchase of new vehicles
- Assistance with finding additional staff and volunteers
- Support for programs that provide an increased level of flexibility for short-term notice routes
- More funding to support low-income users
- Improve collaboration between human service agencies and transportation providers

User Needs

- Consistency of route scheduling, and improved access to transit services on evenings and weekends
- Access to handicapped-accessible services
- Lower costs for transit

- Increased service to medical, entertainment, and shopping destinations
- Expand routes that cross county boundaries

Strategies

- Maintain and expand transportation services in the SMCOG region
- Enhance collaboration between counties, transportation providers, and human service agencies to provide seamless regional mobility and flexibility in route scheduling and availability
- Raise awareness of existing transportation services
- Support human service agencies and transportation providers in their efforts to recruit additional staff and volunteers
- Improve affordability of transportation services for low-income, elderly, and disabled individuals
- Advocate for additional funding to support OATS and other rural transit providers

Prioritization of Needs and Strategies

A second round of public meetings were held for all 10 counties in the SMCOG region. During each of the public meetings, attendees were asked to prioritize needs and strategies by placing dots on a board that displayed the identified needs and strategies. They were asked to place one dot on whichever need that they felt was the most important in the human service/transportation provider needs section, and one dot in the user needs section. They could then use the remaining three dots in the strategies section. The three dots in the strategies section could all be placed on one strategy or on different ones. Attendees also provided additional comments regarding transportation needs/concerns. These comments were listed in the follow-up meetings section. The needs/strategies boards used at the follow-up meetings can be found in Appendix D. The prioritized list of needs/strategies identified in the meetings is listed below:

Human Service / Transportation Provider Needs

- More funding to support low-income users (36)
- Support for programs that provide an increased level of flexibility for short-term notice routes (32)
- Assistance with finding additional staff and volunteers (18)
- Additional monetary support for the purchase of new vehicles (17)
- Improve collaboration between human service agencies and transportation providers (17)

User Needs

- Increased service to medical, entertainment, and shopping destinations (46)
- Consistency of route scheduling, and improved access to transit services on evenings and weekends (24)
- Lower costs for transit (22)
- Expand routes that cross county boundaries (22)
- Access to handicapped-accessible services (18)

Strategies

- Improve affordability of transportation services for low-income, elderly, and disabled individuals (74)
- Advocate for additional funding to support OATS and other rural transit providers (72)
- Raise awareness of existing transportation services (60)
- Enhance collaboration between counties, transportation providers, and human service agencies to provide seamless regional mobility and flexibility in route scheduling and availability (57)
- Maintain and expand transportation services in the SMCOG region (33)
- Support human service agencies and transportation providers in their efforts to recruit additional staff and volunteers (30)

1st Priority Strategy: Improve affordability of transportation services for low-income, elderly, and disabled individuals.

Addressing affordability of transportation services for vulnerable populations emerged as the top priority during public meetings. Community members recognized the pressing need to ensure that low-income, elderly, and disabled individuals have access to affordable transportation options. Many in these demographics face significant challenges in accessing essential services, job opportunities, and healthcare due to current transportation costs. Some activities to improve affordability may include introducing discounted fare programs for qualified individuals, exploring subsidies to reduce financial burden, and establishing partnerships with non-profit organizations to provide additional support.

2nd Priority Strategy: Advocate for additional funding to support OATS and other rural transit providers.

Recognizing the crucial role of rural transit providers in connecting remote areas and smaller communities, the second-ranked strategy is to advocate for additional funding. Community members emphasized that these services are often a lifeline for residents in less densely populated regions, and ensuring their sustainability and expansion is of paramount importance. Some activities to advocate additional funding may include educating elected officials of the public transit needs and advocating for dedicated state funding.

3rd Priority Strategy: Raise awareness of existing transportation services.

While there are various transportation services, community members expressed the need to increase awareness about these options. Many residents, particularly newcomers or those who rarely use public transportation, may be unaware of the available services and how to access them. Communicating with the public about what services are available and how to utilize them would provide the public with greater access to these services. Some activities to raise awareness may involve public service announcements, targeted advertisements, community outreach events, and informational materials distributed through schools, healthcare facilities, and community centers.

4th Priority Strategy: Enhance collaboration between counties, transportation providers, and human service agencies to provide seamless regional mobility and flexibility in route scheduling and availability.

The fourth-ranked strategy centers on fostering collaboration between various stakeholders involved in the transportation system. Community members recognized that a seamless and well-coordinated transportation network requires strong partnerships between counties, transportation providers, and human service agencies. Some activities to enhance collaboration between counties, transportation providers, and human service agencies in the SMCOG region may include the creation of a Multimodal Transportation Advisory Committee (MMTAC) and providing funding to SMCOG to facilitate the MMTAC.

5th Priority Strategy: Maintain and expand transportation services in the SMCOG region.

Acknowledging the importance of maintaining the existing transportation infrastructure, the fifth-ranked strategy emphasizes the need for consistent investment in the SMCOG region's transportation services. Regular maintenance and upgrades are vital to ensure the safety and reliability of transportation options. Some activities to maintain and expand transportation services may include securing funding for the ongoing maintenance of vehicles, infrastructure, and facilities, and exploring opportunities for expanding services to underserved areas or increasing the frequency of existing routes to accommodate growing demand.

6th Priority Strategy: Support human service agencies and transportation providers in their efforts to recruit additional staff and volunteers.

Recognizing the workforce challenges faced by human service agencies and transportation providers, the sixth-ranked strategy aims to support their efforts in recruiting additional staff and volunteers. A well-trained and dedicated workforce is essential for delivering high-quality transportation services to the community. Some activities may include collaborating with workforce development agencies to offer incentives to attract new talent to the transportation sector, engaging the community, and encouraging volunteer participation in supporting transportation services.

Plan Adoption

The plan will be used as a roadmap for improving public transportation in SMCOG's region. The strategies identified in the plan are connected to grant funding. Various grants are identified in the funding overview section and will provide guidance for future projects to promote adequate utilization of federal grants.

The PTHSTCP draft was posted on the SMCOG website on September 11, 2023, for a thirty-day public comment period. Public notices were sent throughout the region to request the public to review the plan and provide input. The plan was reviewed and adopted by SMCOG's Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) on November 8, 2023. The final plan was adopted by the SMCOG Board on December 6, 2023.
